Narrative Report (limit to 500 words)

During my past 20 years of clinical practice in dermatology, I have provided direct patient care in a variety of settings including private practice, academic and inpatient consult service. As Instructor of Dermatology, I have endeavored to bring the clinical expertise derived from approximately 6,500 patient visits per year into the academic setting. My continual service since 1991 as Clinical Associate at the Dermatology Laser and Cosmetic Center at MGH has comprised 10-20% of my time. In that role, I teach the Laser fellows one-on-one, directly supervising their performance of laser procedures, cosmetic treatments such as sclerotherapy, fillers, and neurotoxins, surgical excisions of benign and malignant lesions and medical dermatology. Not only do I train the fellows in the medical and technical aspects of these procedures, but emphasize the need to strive for clinical excellence, to listen actively to patient concerns and meet their expectations in an ethical and caring manner.

I have had the privilege over the years to supervise many talented fellows, several of whom have risen to positions of prominence in the field of dermatology. Former trainees include a department chairman, two past presidents of the American Society of Laser Medicine and Surgery, assistant and associate professors of dermatology.
